Members Meeting

OSCR

Following the OSCR inquiry from July 2020, a response from OSCR has now been received and the inquiry has now been closed. The response from OSCR notes: "Having fully reviewed and considered all the information provided we consider the actions of the charity trustees to be consistent with the general duties that they are subject to under the 2005 Act. We have not identified any matters of a regulatory nature that warrant any further action by us at this time and as a result are closing our inquiry."

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What a Scorcher!

Look towards the east this month and you will find the brightest star in the night sky rising over the Kintyre hills. The star is Sirius which resides in the constellation of Canis Major (the Great Dog). Sirius appears so bright because it is not that far from us in our corner of the Milky Way. It is twice as bright as the next bright star in our night sky.

It is nicknamed the Dog Star but in ancient Greece is was known as Seirios which translates to 'the Scorcher'. The ancient Greeks even believed that this star provided additional heat to our Sun in summer to create hot humid days known as 'dog days'. For the Egyptians, Sirius was the celestial sign that marked the start of the Nile floods and what was hoped would be good harvest. The Polynesians of the Pacific used Sirius to mark winter and was also an important reference for their navigation around the ocean.

Sirius is a young star compared to our Sun and unlike our Sun it has a faint companion star nicknamed 'the Pup'. You need a telescope to see this faint star which is only the size of Earth. To find Sirius draw an imaginary line through the three stars of Orion's Belt and extend that line towards the horizon.

Board Action Plan

Every year the Board prepare an Action Plan to help focus the work of the Trust over the next year. The 2022 Board Action plan is as follows:

1. Continue to reduce the debt burden on IGHT to below £500,000.

2. Identify a programme of further housing and agricultural improvements.

3. GTL to open and operate the Gigha camp and motor home site.

4. Take forward and secure funding for Ardminish Housing project.

5. Develop the Activity Centre business by installing a solar PV system and offering e-bikes for hire.

6. Continue the programme to improve the path network and interpretation on the island.

7. Continue to deliver Achamore Gardens Development Plan and continue Phase 1 works.

8. GREL/ GGPL Boards to continue exploring succession planning for the turbine income.

9. Begin the island wide Woodland Management Plan.

10. Engage volunteers in environmental projects and promote low carbon initiatives where possible.

11. Review opportunities for EV charging points.

 Launch new Visit Gigha marketing platforms and ensure all island businesses are well represented.
Continue promotion of the Gigha Community Fund to support small island projects and initiatives.
Continue regular reviewing of policies and risks.
Facilitate skills development and training opportunities for staff, directors, and residents.
Continue the process of reviewing core costs

and achieving value for money.

Gigha and Cara Parish Church

The next service in the church will be on 13th February with Rev. Anne McIvor. At this service there will be the ordination of a new Elder followed by Holy Communion. All are welcome to join us at this service. At this time while the services are once a month the Church building is benefiting by being heated in the middle of the week for the craft and singing groups. If you like singing and crafting why not come along. Singing hasn't started up again yet but crafting starts at the beginning of February.

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Ardminish Housing Development

The initial consultation for the housing development began when John Forbes from Communities Housing Trust attended the EGM held on 18th July 2019. This was the same date that the housing needs survey was launched. The purpose of this survey was to inform further development plans, and to help establish if there is demand for future new housing in Gigha. There were 54 responses to the survey, representing 132 people. 91% said they permanently reside on Gigha, meaning 120 residents contributed to the survey. This is a high response and a good representation of the community's views. The survey revealed that at least 17 people were either looking to move back to Gigha or move out of an existing property on the island. Thereafter, a report of the survey data was made available on the Gigha website and publicised in the Members newsletters. Any further updates about the development were also included in newsletters and at

The Trust currently has 3 vacant properties. 1 is being sold (Kinnererach which was agreed a number of years ago), 1 is being held for the Campsite Manager, and 1 has been advertised. There are currently 27 registers for Homehunt Gigha, further demonstrating demand for more housing on the island.

Despite the Trust selling properties to reduce the debt burden, retaining ownership of these properties would still not address the need for more housing to support the economic activity on the island.

The new housing development is also being designed to meet varying needs that are currently not being met on the island, including fully wheelchair accessible.

We understand that nearly 2.5 years have passed since the initial survey for housing demand and needs took place however projects of this scale take some time to develop. The Board must move forward on projects based on the information obtained from the community and cannot re-start projects over the course of the development stage given the level of funds, time, and resources invested in these projects. The Board therefore ask that anyone who has any comments on the development to please write into the Board if you have not done so already.

Countryside Ranger

What an incredibly mild January we seem to have had. Achamore Gardens' bulbs are sprouting, the daffodils are well and truly on their way around the village, and we haven't yet seen the frost!

This is also a great time of year to take note of our bird species. The village has been filled with finches, blackbirds and sparrows, the hen harrier has been swooping over the fields at north Ardminish, wigeons and red breasted mergansers are occupying our shorelines, and snipe are being spotted amongst the heather. These species are in hyper feeding mode just now, making stores and increasing their strength for breeding season soon to arrive. However, this year has seen a notable decrease in the variety of geese species, we are yet to see the white fronted goose or barnacle goose, and there are definitely less geese squawking in our skies. Please let me know if you see any of these species, so we can make sure our records are accurate and able to draw comparisons from the past year and in the future.



In other wildlife news, some of you may have seen on our social media pages that a Kemp Ridley's sea turtle washed up on our southern shoreline. Whilst out with a volunteer for a beach clean, we came across the turtle which unfortunately was not alive. The stranding was reported to the Marine Conservation Society, but sadly on this occasion little could be done to find out what happened to this turtle. However, this kind of data is important and will help to indicate what is happening with turtle populations across the UK and the world. This information will also be able to contribute to conservation efforts now and in the future in the face of environmental changes such as climate change. There are many reasons for this turtle ending up on our shorelines, such as being swept off course by storms and being stuck in ocean currents, ingesting pollutants such as marine plastics, being injured by fishing activity, or simply coming to the end of its natural life and carried to our shore. The Kemp Ridley's sea turtle is usually distributed throughout the Gulf of Mexico and the east coast of the United States, and is the smallest sea turtle in the world. Not only this, but they are also the most endangered, with bycatch in commercial and recreational fishing gear continuing to be the biggest threat facing this species. This piece of news reached the Campbeltown Courier in the last week of January, which is great in raising awareness of strandings, environmental and species population changes, and informing conservation efforts. This small turtle has found its way back into the sea to now become part of the natural life cycle and is likely to be a source of food for other marine creatures. My small plea is that if a stranding is found, please contact myself or organisations such as the Marine Conservation Society to seek professional help before trying to interact with the animal whether alive or not. This will allow the animal to receive the best response for science or its welfare.

Leading on to our own conservation efforts. This month the Ranger Service has set up a conservation work party that will aim to take place on every 3rd Friday morning of the month. January's first session was fantastic. A team of 5 participants helped to clear the woodland that houses our new pathway heading towards Leim Farm. The woodland is being cleared of invasive and over abundant vegetation to:

- Increase light in the woodland to make way for a greater variety of ground flora to support our insect, butterfly and bird species.

- Reinforce woodland edges to provide wind shields, shelters and feeding habitats for both woodland and farmland birds.

- Make way for additional tree planting to go ahead in the coming months.

- Create a mosaic of different habitats to support a wider variety of wildlife.



Thank you to everyone who joined in and a special thank you for your patience whilst I attempted to light a Kelly Kettle with soggy matches! If you'd like to join in on a session please don't hesitate to get in touch - I promise more efficient tea making facilities will be used. Future sessions will include tree planting, invasive species removal, beach cleans, and path maintenance amongst many other things.

Camp and Motorhome Manager

The advertisement for a manager for the new Camp and Motorhome site generated considerable interest with over 350 initial registers of interest. Seven applicants were shortlisted for interview with some very strong candidates to choose from. We are pleased to announce that Anna Lannigan has accepted the position and will be joining us on the 1st of March. Anna will be residing at Croft 3-4. Gateway to Gigha

Those of you who live on the island will have seen the rapid progress on the new paths over the past weeks. The Garbh Eilean path is complete, as is the route from the Ardlamey track along the island's backbone to the Leim track. Finishing touches are being put to the Fire Station to Village Hall track, and good progress is being made on the Boathouse to Port a'Chinn Mhoir (Johnny's Shore) route. Now it's onwards to Phase 2. The paths in this phase will be for walkers only, with routes waymarked and walking surfaces improved with the placement of steppingstones, stone 'steps' (flat-topped stones and boulders) and, in at least one location, a stretch of plaswood (recycled plastic) boardwalk. These routes will take shape over the coming months. In the meantime, we continue to work with our heritage consultants towards the creation of our heritage interpretation infrastructure. Hand-built stone plinths will form bases for the main panels, with smaller panels being mounted on plaswood lecterns. These will be an integral feature of our paths network, with additional heritage and paths information presented on our new visitor website.

The planned Community Heritage Project is also taking shape with Historic Environment Scotland staff and experts on 'ogham' and archaeological 3D modelling from Glasgow University visiting in March. Archaeology Scotland are also planning to visit, so that we hope to be able to announce an exciting series of training events and activities in the next newsletter. The remainder of our e-bikes will be delivered in the near future too, along with training in their maintenance.

Achamore Gardens

The arrival of winter always heralds the start of another area of restoration in the Gardens, and this year we are focussing on clearing the old Macabeanum Wood which lies to the east of the pond. This area of the Gardens is so badly choked with our old enemies, Rhododendron ponticum and bramble that there are plants I have never managed to reach, only knowing of their existence in the spring, when the occasional scarlet bloom pokes it's head above the jungle.

The team set about work in the Macabeanum at the start of January, and I'm in awe of the progress our wee group have made! We started out clearing along the old ditch lines so that Tim Lister could get in with his trusty digger to clear the choked ditches, before spreading out to clear the rest of the area. Maggie Lister is now an expert at bramble removal, having developed a range of techniques to suit every situation, and she's passed that expertise onto the rest of us - the brambles don't stand a chance now! We've also removed tons of ancient ponticum that was clogging up the area, and Tim and the digger have done a great job of pulling out the root plates to ensure it doesn't come back. Bit by bit we are discovering many lost treasures, as well as creating lots of space for future planting, so at the moment the cleared areas do look a bit bare, but soon we'll fill them up again. As well as clearing the ditches and ponticum roots, Tim has replaced the 2 old wooden bridges that lead to the hospital garden/Macabeanum and to the pond.

These bridges had reached the end of their lives and were beginning to rot, so had to be replaced for safety apart from anything else. Tim has built two beautiful stone culverts to replace the old bridges and was helped in this by Morgan (our Apprentice Gardener) and Kacper (appointed through the Kickstart scheme) who put their drystone walling training from last year to good use, helping to build the new headwalls and repair the HaHa (the retaining wall of the ditch).

The stairs up the hill have deteriorated and are now unsafe, with a high risk of injury to walkers. We are working on a repair solution for this path, so I'm hopeful that the path won't be shut for too long, but at this stage I can't give a timescale for it's reopening.
