#### **Office Manager**

We'd like to welcome Shona Bannatyne into her role as Office Manager. Shona's role will manage a variety of aspects within the office and support the 4 companies and employees.

#### **Head Gardener Job Vacancy**

The job advert for the Head Gardener position at Achamore Gardens has now been advertised publicly with an application deadline of 20th December. Subject to suitable candidates coming forward, we hope to hold interviews and appoint someone in the New Year. The Trust are looking to appoint a creative and passionate experienced professional who will work with the Trust and Community to develop the Garden, including restoration of key areas, working with other staff and volunteers and marketing the Garden. The role comes with a rent-free cottage also to support the job vacancy.

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## **Gigha Community Fund**

The Gigha Community Fund has launched with application forms being made available as of Thursday 12th December on the website or from the Trust office. Guidance notes will also be available along with details of the first deadline for submission in mid-January. £5000 per year will be made available from the island's renewable energy income 'to support a thriving and healthy community on Gigha.'

## **Clear Skies for Community Stargazing Event**

Gigha's Community Stargazing event had a backdrop of thousands of stars when it took place in November. We were very lucky to have such a stunning night sky for those adults and children who came along.

The evening started on the track to Gallochoille where we watched the International Space Station rise up in the south west and cross the sky in front of us. We then returned to the hall to warm up with a cup of tea and get information about why it is important to protect our night sky from light pollution.

Those attending then heard about the proposals to have a Dark Sky Discovery site at the most northern part of the island. This would involve creating a dark sky theatre (circle of log seats) with a night sky information board and Dark Sky Discovery marker post. As part of the work towards Dark Sky Discovery site status night sky readings have been taken across several locations on Gigha and the results confirm that Gigha has very dark skies with light pollution restricted to just a few locations. The final part of the evening was a stargazing session at the airstrip where powerful binoculars were available to view star clusters and nebula. We were also lucky to see several 'shooting stars' and satellites and identify some of the constellations.

Our plans are now to apply for Dark Sky Discovery site status with the International Dark Sky Association, a process which can take some time, and to also continue with community stargazing events on particular themes throughout 2020. #### **Hebridean Whale Trail**

The Hebridean Whale and Dolphin Trust (HWDT) were granted funding for their Hebridean Whale Trail (HWT) project which identifies locations across the west coast that are prime destinations for viewing marine life. Gigha was selected as one of 30 locations across Scotland's west coast to form the Trail, and further promote the region as one of Europe's premier whale-watch destinations. Funding has come to an end for the trail, however Gigha will soon receive an interpretation pannel from the HWT to explain what is unique about Gigha's position on the trail. Jane recently attended the HWT event in Tobermory where the HWDT were seeking ways to ensure that the future of the trail is secured. The HWDT are exploring funding options to provide training on how communities can identify marine life from the coast. 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#### **Achamore Gardens Blog**

On Thursday 21st November it being a lovely afternoon I took my camera for a walk in Achamore gardens! November – maybe not the best of times to see the gardens. My last walk in the gardens was just before Easter when the Rhododendrons were flowering, and the walled garden was being smartened up for a wedding. Since then there has been a lot of growth in the gardens, mostly things we don't really want to grow! But there was also a wealth of flower buds waiting to bloom next year, Rhododendrons and Camellias in particular.

There is still some autumn colour to be seen. The sun was shining and catching the top of a magnificent Metasequoia near the wee red gate into the walled garden. This species is a very ancient one and is a deciduous conifer. The pond had good reflections and growing around its edge are Cornus with its bare stems glowing red. There are still Hydrangeas, Fuchsias and some herbaceous plants flowering.

There are plenty of things to see. Try looking at the leaves of the Camellias in the south drive. There are 3 varieties that have very distinctive leaves. J.C.Williams which has a mid-green slightly twisted leaf, Golden Spangles which has a yellow variegation in its leaf and another whose name I cannot remember which has a kind of fishtail at the point of its leaf.

Don't forget to look up when you are in the gardens. The patterns of the bare trees against the sky are amazing and you could miss some flowers if you don't look up. Right in the very north west corner of the walled garden in the back of the border is a tall shrub with lots of little pink flowers which I think is a myrtle. Nearer to the gate onto the back road there are two Mahonias flowering. They have a wonderful scent, but you might need a stepladder to get near enough to smell them!

Close by there is a Eucryphia also in flower. Some of the conifers in the walled garden have Lapageria rosa growing through them. If you are going for a walk in the gardens just now, I recommend wellington boots for your feet. And don't forget to look down too. See if you can identify the trees around by their fallen leaves!
